

The Seven-Step Writing Recipe

Step One: Research

Who's in Charge

The Scribe

What You Need

- Focused attention for reading and note-taking
- Periods of open attention to look for connections and avenues of research
- Interviews, books, online sources
- Pen/paper or word processor for freewriting
- Tools for taking notes (Evernote, etc.)

- 1. Gather the research or conduct interviews
- 2. Freewrite to explore
- 3. Consolidate and review your notes

Step Two: Incubation

Who's in Charge

The Muse

What You Need

- Open attention and solitude
- A break in time and distance
- A piece of paper and pencil, or note-taking technology (in case sudden brilliance strikes)

- 1. Review the notes. Focus on one or two unresolved issues.
- 2. Step away from the work and do other things.
- 3. Take note of any insights that might arise.

Step Three: Structure

Who's in Charge

The Scribe

What You Need

- Focused attention
- Notes from the research phase
- Your favorite outlining tools: pen or pencil and paper, word processor, mind-mapping software, notecards and markers, whiteboard, etc.

- 1. Clarify your objectives
- 2. Review your research and notes
- 3. Create the structure
- 4. Paste your notes into the outline structure to prime the drafting
- 5. Share with others (if required)

Step Four: Drafting

Who's in Charge

The Scribe and the Muse collaborate (when you realize flow) or contribute in alternating bursts (the rest of the time)

What You Need

- Periods of both focused and open attention
- A distraction-free place to work (your ideal environment for flow)
- Your favorite tools for drafting

- 1. Define your objectives
- 2. Write without self-criticism
- 3. Rest
- 4. Revisit and continue

Step Five: Let the Draft Rest

Who's in Charge

The Scribe *must* take a break during this phase; the Muse may choose to return

What You Need

- At least one full night of sleep
- Elapsed time

- 1. Make a wish list of the problems you'd like to solve.
- 2. Let time pass.

Step Six: Revise

Who's in Charge

The Scribe runs this phase, ideally with occasional input from the Muse

What You Need

- Focused attention
- The rough draft
- Editing tools (paper, electronic)
- Friends, editors, colleagues
- Patience

Steps

- 1. Start with structure and work your way down
- Revise tone and style for reader's flow; look for cultural biases, the fallacy of sounding smart, the Curse of Knowledge, and selfindulgence
- 3. Edit iteratively
- 4. Proofread

Enlist outside help for any or all of these steps.

Step Seven: Publishing

What You Need

- A deadline (external or internal)
- Patience to get it right
- Impatience to get the words into the world

- 1. Let the draft sit at least overnight.
- 2. Decide to publish.
